

## Oakland Chamber of Commerce 2022 Voter Poll Key Results


For over 25 years the Chamber has annually engaged a data research firm to poll Oakland residents' views on a host of quality of life, economic, business, and public safety issues as well as the efficacy of our elected officials. We use this information to educate our city leadership on what their constituents feel and want from their government. The 604 dual-mode voter survey was conducted October 8-12, by FM3 Research with results weighted to reflect the demographic profile of likely November 2022 voters and the poll's margin of error is +/- 4.0 percent. Key findings from the survey include the following:

- Voters continue to be deeply pessimistic about the city's direction, the local economy, and their views of local government.
- By a wide margin, homelessness and housing costs continue to be among the most acute problems facing Oakland, but gun violence and crime have joined the top tier of problems.
- The percentage who feel less safe in Oakland than a year ago is at an all-time high, with support for increasing the number of police and perceptions that attrition in the police force has harmed Oakland's safety.
- There is widespread agreement that having more large companies locate in Oakland is good for the economy.
- The rate of development is an increasing concern and a majority say the rate of housing development is too slow; majorities favor speeding up the
- development process in response to the housing crisis.
- The race for Mayor is a dead heat between Loren Taylor and Sheng Thao, with Ignacio De La Fuente also competitive.


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### Homelessness, gun violence, homeless encampments, and crime are seen as the top problems facing Oakland




#### Too little growth and development is more than twice as concerning to voters as too much growth and development.





## A majority says that the number of police officers should be increased.

Do you think the number of police officers in the Oakland Police Department should be increased, kept the same, or decreased?




## Voters continue to broadly agree that having more large companies is good for the Oakland economy.





## A majority agrees that the best solution to Oakland's housing crisis is to speed up development rather than implement regulatory restrictions.


Which of the following statements comes closest to your personal opinion:

Would you say you feel safer today in <u>Ookland</u> than you did a year or two ago, or would you say you feel less safe?


